### **OUR NEW CONSTITUTION**

The following Constitution was adopted at the annual meeting of the Society held at the Lancaster Theological Seminary, June 7, 1960 and was approved by General Council at its meeting in Milwaukee, October 16–20, 1960:

### CONSTITUTION OF THE

### HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF THE EVANGELICAL AND REFORMED CHURCH

### ARTICLE I. NAME

This Society shall be known as THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF THE EVANGELICAL AND REFORMED CHURCH.

### ARTICLE II. OBJECT

The object of this Society shall be:

- To stimulate and cultivate interest in the heritage of the Reformed Church in the United States, the Evangelical Synod of North America, and the Evangelical and Reformed Church.
- 2. To collect and preserve historical material of the Churches and to make it accessible to all who are interested.

### ARTICLE III. OFFICERS

1. The work of the Society shall be directed by the Executive Committee which shall meet at the call of the president with five members as a quorum. This Committee shall be elected for two-year terms as follows:

Four members by the General Synod
Three members by the Historical Society
One member by each of the regional chapters of the Society.

2. The Executive Committee shall elect the officers of the Society as follows: a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and two Librarians, one each for the Lancaster and the Eden Archives and Libraries. The term of office shall be two years.

### ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

Any person may become a member of this Society by the payment of one dollar annually, or a life member by the payment of twenty-five dollars.

### ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held at a time and place designated by the Executive Committee, at which, in addition to the transaction of business, an historical essay shall be read by a person chosen for that purpose.

### ARTICLE VI. ARCHIVES AND LIBRARIES

To further achieve the object and purpose of the Society, the following archives and libraries shall be constituted and administered as follows:

- Section I. The Lancaster Central Archive and Library.
  - 1. The Lancaster Central Archive and Library of the Historical Society located in the Fackenthal Library of Franklin and Marshall College, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, shall collect, preserve, catalog, and make available for research historical material relating to the Reformed Church in the United States, the Evangelical Synod of North America and the Evangelical and Reformed Church. It shall be under the direction of a local Lancaster Archive and Library Committee to be appointed by the Executive Committee, which shall consist of not more than five members, one of whom shall be the Lancaster Archive Librarian.
  - 2. The material to be collected relating to the three Churches referred to above shall include the following:
    - a. Books and publications.
    - b. Books and pamphlets written by ministers or members.
    - Biographies, photographs, letters, diaries, and sermons.
    - d. Catechisms, hymn books, liturgies, prayerbooks, books of worship, in use in congregations at different times.
    - e. Minutes of judicatories of the respective Churches.
    - f. Records of congregations which may be deposited in the Archives for safekeeping.
    - g. Publications of seminaries, colleges and academies within the respective Churches.
    - h. Files of periodicals and publications.
    - Essays and addresses prepared by members of the Society and pastors and members of the Churches.
    - j. Microfilm and photostat copies of otherwise inaccessible material.
    - k. All material related to church unions originating in and related to the activities of union commissions and agencies of the Reformed Church in the United States, the Evangelical Synod of North America, and the Evangelical and Reformed Church, except all documents and material originating in and related to the activities of

- union commissions and agencies of the Evangelical Synod which shall be deposited in the Eden-Evangelical Synod Archive.
- 1. Mission material records.
- m. Any other material and documents related to the life and work of the Churches, their congregations, institutions and organizations which, according to the respective librarians, should be preserved.
- 3. The Lancaster Central Archive shall hold these materials in perpetuity, unless otherwise stipulated, under safeguards for their use and preservation to be determined by the Executive Committee.
- 4. The manner of classifying and cataloging these materials in order to maintain the integrity and continuity of the items referring to the respective Churches shall be determined by the librarian.

### Section II. The Eden Archives and Library.

- 1. The Eden Archives and Library of the Historical Society located at Eden Seminary, Webster Groves, Missouri, shall consist of two sections to be known as:
  - a. The Eden-Evangelical Synod Archive and Library, and
  - b. The Eden-Evangelical and Reformed Church Archive and Library.

The administration and maintenance expense of the Eden Archives and Library shall be computed in the budget to be annually submitted to the Executive Committee by the Eden Archives Committee.

Each of these archives shall be organized and maintained as a separate and independent unit as follows:

- a. The Eden-Evangelical Synod Archive and Library shall collect, preserve, catalog, and make available for research all material related to the Evangelical Synod of North America as designated in the categories enumerated and defined in Article VI, Section I, 2.
- b. The Eden-Evangelical Synod Archive and Library shall hold these materials in perpetuity, unless otherwise stipulated, under safeguards, for their use and preservation, to be determined by the Executive Committee.
- 2. The Eden-Evangelical and Reformed Church Archive and Library.
  - a. The Eden-Evangelical and Reformed Church Archive and Library shall collect, preserve, catalog, and make available for research material related to the Evangelical and Reformed Church as designated in the categories enumerated and defined in Article VI, Section I, 2.
  - b. The Eden-Evangelical and Reformed Church Archive and Library shall hold these materials in perpetuity, unless otherwise stipulated, under safeguards for their use and preservation to be determined by the Executive Committee.
- 3. The Eden Archives and Library shall be under the direction of a local Eden Archives

and Library Committee to be appointed by the Executive Committee, which shall consist of not more than five members, one of whom shall be the Eden Archives Librarian.

#### ARTICLE VII. SYNODICAL HISTORIANS

- The Society shall request the elections by the several Synods of Synodical Historians who will represent the interests and support the activities and projects of the Society within their Synod.
- 2. The duties of the Synodical Historians shall include the following:
  - a. To collect materials related to the Reformed Church in the United States, the Evangelical Synod of North America, and the Evangelical and Reformed Church as designated in the categories enumerated and defined in Article VI, Section I, 2.
  - b. To secure, where necessary, the approval of the Synods and congregations to turn this material over to the archives at Lancaster and/or Eden according to the jurisdiction of these respective archives as defined above.
  - c. To foster a general interest in the history of local congregations, of the Synod as well as of the denomination.
  - d. To cultivate the spirit of research looking toward the preparation of papers and articles dealing with the history of the Synod, its ministers and congregations.
  - To cooperate with the Executive Committee of the Historical Society as additional activities and projects may be suggested.

### ARTICLE VIII. CHAPTERS

- To further achieve the object of the Society, Chapters may be organized, comprised of Synods, groups of Synods or other regional groups.
- Each Chapter shall elect its own officers, including a representative to the Executive Committee, and will plan and conduct its own programs of meetings and activities in cooperation with the Society.

#### ARTICLE IX. AMENDENTS

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any regular meeting of the Society.

### A HISTORY OF THE EVANGELICAL AND REFORMED CHURCH

An event of more than usual significance is the appearance, this Spring, of a book containing a fresh interpretation of the history of our denomination. Published by our Christian Education Press, at \$5.95, the volume with the above title was prepared over the past few years under the editorial direction of our Historical Committee.

The book is a companion volume to *The Faith We Proclaim*. The latter attempts to reflect "those things most surely believed" among members of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. Together the two books form an invaluable record of the history

and doctrine of a church notable not so much for its denominational peculiarities as for its zeal for

the unity of the people of God.

The first ten chapters of A History of the Evangelical and Reformed Church tells the story of European backgrounds, the adventurous migrations to the New World, the development, through succeeding centuries, of churches, colleges, seminaries, hospitals and other institutions. Men and movements, ideas and institutions are faithfully reflected in perspective.

Chapter 11 traces the steps that led to the 1934 union of the Reformed Church in the United States and the Evangelical Synod of North America and assesses its churchly and theological significance. Chapter 12 interprets the events of the last two

decades [1940-1960].

The volume was began under the chairmanship of Dr. Carl E. Schneider, emeritus professor of Church History at Eden Theological Seminary, and completed under that of Dr. David Dunn, professor of Church History at The Lancaster Theological Seminary. In addition to these two historians the following have written one or more chapters: Dr. Paul N. Crusius, deceased, of the faculty of Elmhurst College, Dr. Josias Friedli, emeritus professor of Church History at the Mission House Theological Seminary, Dr. Theophil W. Menzel, pastor of Bethel Church in Manchester, Michigan, Dr. William Toth, Audenried Professor of History at Franklin and Marshall College and Dr. James E. Wagner, President of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. A beautiful jacket design was prepared by Anna Atene.

## REVIVALISM IN THE GERMAN REFORMED CHURCH

Revivalism in the German Reformed Church in the United States to 1850 with Emphasis on the Eastern Synod is the title of the doctoral dissertation of Prof. John B. Frantz, Jr. for which he was awarded a Doctor of Philosophy degree at the winter commencement of the University of Pennsylvania. Currently Dr. Frantz is a member of the History Department at Franklin and Marshall College. The son of Dr. John B. Frantz, Sr., pastor of Trinity Church, Pottstown, Pa., the author of this historical work received his A.B. degree from Franklin and Marshall College and his M.A. in History from Penn.

The materials for the book were gathered, in the main, from primary sources in our Lancaster Archives. After a preliminary background for revivalism in general, Dr. Frantz deals with the introduction of revivalism into the German Reformed Church, the methods employed, the official attitude of the Church toward revivalism, the reaction of church members and pastors and the renewed emphasis on the objective institution of the Church.

We hope to obtain a copy for our Archives.

### ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

President David Dunn has recently appointed two Archive Committees: for Eden—Elmer Hoefer, Warren Mehl [Eden Seminary Librarian], and Dr. Carl E. Schneider; for Lancaster: Dr. George Bricker [Lancaster Seminary Librarian], Miss Elizabeth Kieffer, and Prof. Herbert Anstaett.

### THE PENNSYLVANIA GERMAN SOCIETY

For many years Evangelical and Reformed clergy and laymen were part of the backbone of the Pennsylvania German Society, which now has its headquarters in the Fackenthal Library, Franklin and Marshall College, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. In fact, the Society was founded in Lancaster in 1891, largely through the efforts of the faculties of Franklin and Marshall College and the Lancaster Theological Seminary.

There has been a resurgence of interest in the Pennsylvania German Society since the executive offices have been moved from Norristown, Pennsylvania. Miss Elizabeth C. Kieffer serves as archivist for both the Lancaster Central Archive and Library of the Historical Society of the Evangelical and Reformed Church and the Pennsylvania German Society. Herbert B. Anstaett, Librarian of the Historical Society at Lancaster, is a consultant.

Clergy and laymen who are interested are invited to submit their names to Professor Kenneth D. Longsdorf, Administrative Secretary, in care of the Fackenthal Library, Franklin and Marshall College. Minimum dues are five dollars per year, for which members receive an attractively printed annual volume. For many years the Reverend T. R. Brendle, Egypt, Pennsylvania, was Secretary of the Board. The Reverend William J. Rupp, Souderton, Pennsylvania, is Vice-President. The Reverend Clarence R. Rahn, Temple, Pennsylvania, is a member of the Board also.

### EAST PENNSYLVANIA SYNOD MEMBERSHIPS

Rev. Donald J. Ely, Synod Historian, has completed an exceedingly successful solicitation in securing memberships for the Society from East Pennsylvania Synod pastors. Of the fifty-eight pastors in the Synod, fifty-two are now 1961 members of the Society, including one life member. Rev. Ely spoke personally to his fellow clergymen, sent out two communications (and in some instances, three), and in several cases he telephoned them. He felt that a contributing factor in his favor was the reasonableness of the dues, only one dollar a year. He is to be highly commended for his outstanding work.

## OUR CONGREGATIONAL BRETHREN REMIND US

Our Evangelical and Reformed tradition is to value our historical past. However, in our age voices have been raised in depreciation of the past as something of little importance. We have been mightily tempted and have yielded, therefore, to take the following excerpt from the valedictory address of Dr. Arthur H. Bradford, retiring president of The Congregational Christian Historical Society, as a timely reminder:

"This Society of ours, which I love and hope to

serve as a devoted member as long as I live, faces

a great opportunity, all its own.
"I trust that our Society will concern itself increasingly with Biography. Let us bring vividly into the present the men and women to whose wisdom, faith and courage we are in debt for our Congregational Christian heritage. Wasn't it Napoleon who said that 'on the field of battle the happiest inspiration is most often a recollection'? Certainly this is true in the battle of life and on the hidden battlefields of the spirit. Here, then, in the work of this Society, is a task for our whole Congregational Christian Fellowship, regardless of its present unhappy differences of opinion in reference to Church Union. All of us, pro-union and anti-union, cherish the same memories of the past which belongs to us all. Therefore, the more we study that past together, with the open mind of true scholarship, the more we shall be drawn together, in mutual understanding and good will, to achieve, at long last, a greater, stronger, more inclusive Fellowship than any we have known. So may it be! In the name of God, Amen."

To express this faith in the role of the Historical Society a budget of \$9,290 was adopted at the

same meeting.

### SPRING MEETINGS

The annual meeting of the Society will be held this year at Eden Theological Seminary, Webster Grove, Mo., in connection with the Seminary commencement on June 9. The Western Chapter meet-

ing will take place at the same time.

During the commencement at Lancaster Theological Seminary the Eastern Chapter will hold a meeting at 9:15 A.M., Tuesday, June 6. Dr. James Stewart Prentice, emeritus professor of History at Middlebury College, will read a paper on "The Genesis of the Seminary." It is expected that he will throw dramatically new light on the beginnings of the Seminary at Carlisle, Pa., where he has unearthed new data.

### HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF THE EVANGELICAL AND REFORMED CHURCH

The list of 507 members is the largest in the history of the Society. There has been a gain of fifty-two members since last year. There were 192 members in 1956, 235 in 1957, 353 in 1958, 455 in 1959, all record years. Of the members in 1960, 369 are annual and 138 are life members. During 1960, 26 life members were enrolled. Renewal memberships for 1961 are now due. An application blank is enclosed to be used for this renewal or for a new membership.

It is gratifying to report that all Synods were represented on the membership roll, as follows: South Illinois, 7; South Indiana, 6; South Wisconsin, 8; Southeast Ohio, 6; Southern, 41; Southwest Ohio, 8; Susquehanna, 18; Texas, 4; West New York, 5.
